NAOSH Week Wrap Up

The goal of the annual North American Occupational Safety & Health (NAOSH) Week is to focus the attention of employers, employees, the general public and all partners in occupational safety, health and the environment on the importance of preventing injury and illness in the workplace. Through these efforts we are striving to: increase understanding of the benefits of investment in occupational health and safety; raise awareness of the contribution of safety, health, and environmental professionals; and help reduce workplace injuries and illnesses by encouraging new health, safety, and environmental activities and interest in NAOSH week.

In Washington DC, the United States 110th Congress designated the week of May 6 through May 12, 2007, as 'North American Occupational Safety and Health Week,' and May 9, 2007, as 'Occupational Safety and Health Professional Day.' A Resolution was submitted, considered, and agreed upon by the United States Senate, and it was submitted by Mr. Durbin, Mr. Isakson, Mr. Obama, and Mr. Kennedy.

The ASSE's Greater Boston Chapter celebrated NAOSH week 2007 with a proclamation that was signed by several State Senators at the Massachusetts State House in Boston. Those present at the state house to receive the proclamation from State Senator Brian Joyce included Mary Vogel ~ Construction Safety Alliance, Joe Fulliero ~ ASSE GBC VP of Government Affairs 07'-08', Corey Briggs, CIH, CET ~ AIHA New England Section President Elect 07'-08', David Crowley, CSP, CET, CHMM ~ ASSE GBC VP of Government Affairs 06'-07', Don Delikat, CIH ~ AIHA New England Section President 06'-07', Mary Ellen Doherty, CHMM ~ ACHMM New England Chapter President.

On the same day we received the Senatorial Proclamation in Boston, in a separate event, Governor Deval Patrick pledged \$15 million to a statewide anticrime plan, which includes 11 million for community safety grants at the Massachusetts State House.

Further efforts were also undertaken by Andy Knapp, who is on the Board of Directors for ASSE GBC Govt. Affairs, to have a proclamation signed stating his commitment towards NAOSH week by Donald L. Carcieri, the Governor of Rhode Island.

ASSE's Greater Boston Chapter thanks the aforementioned individuals and all safety professionals for their commitment and involvement to NAOSH week, and to furthering the advancement and awareness for Occupational Safety and Health.

EPA Brings Attention to Start of New Diesel Sulfur Content Standard

EPA Slashes Sulfur Content of Diesel Fuel for Trains, Ships, and Non-road Equipment

Harmful emissions from locomotives, most marine vessels, and land-based nonroad engines will be cut starting June 1 because of new standards for sulfur content in diesel fuel.

Under a 2004 clean-air regulation established by EPA, refineries must reduce sulfur from current levels of about 3,000 parts per million in nonroad diesel fuel to a maximum of 500 ppm, with few exceptions.

This is the latest step in EPA's campaign to clean up diesel fuel used in the United States. Last June, rules took effect requiring 80 percent of highway diesel to have an ultra-low sulfur level of 15 or fewer ppm.

In 2010, sulfur levels in most nonroad diesel fuel will be reduced to the same ultra-low requirement, making it possible for engine manufacturers to use advanced emissions control systems that significantly reduce harmful pollutants. For locomotive and marine fuel, this step will occur in 2012.

Appeals Courts Upholds OSHA Use of ACGIH TLVs

Appeals Court Sides With OSHA In Case Challenging Threshold Limit Values May 14 2007

On May 11, a unanimous panel of three judges from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit sided with OSHA and the U.S. Labor Department (DOL) in a key case involving Threshold Limit Values (TLVs), which OSHA recognizes but some industry groups attack because they are privately developed.

OSHA's recognition of updated TLVs does not involve rulemaking and thus does not give stakeholders a chance to oppose them, the National Association of Manufacturers (NAM) argued in *National Association of Manufacturers vs. OSHA and Elaine Chao, Secretary of the United States Department of Labor*, No. 06-1122.

In an opinion written by Judge David S. Tatel, the judges agreed with DOL and dismissed NAM's lawsuit as untimely -- a clear victory for the OSHA/DOL argument that OSHA's recognition of new TLVs issued by the American Conference of Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH) on Jan. 31, 2006, did not reopen or revise the Hazard Communication Standard (HCS) itself, which would require formal rulemaking....

Florida Legislature Passes Mold Remediation Bill

The Florida legislature has passed mold assessment and remediation requirements in a bill aimed at regulating building inspection professionals. Last year, ASSE was successful in making sure that occupational safety training was recognized in the bill. This year, in an April 6 letter to the bill's sponsor, ASSE Region 4 RVP for Government Affairs Ed Granberry, Jr., expressed concern that the qualifications for mold assessors in the bill would allow an individual with a 2-year degree or a GED to practice as a mold assessor. The letter went on to say that, "While no one kind of coursework or training ensures competency in mold assessment, a four-year degree in microbiology, engineering, architecture, industrial hygiene or occupational safety coupled with at least 5 years of documented experience will at least give the kind of broad-based decision-making skills and experience to ensure a level of professional competence not typically achieved in those who have not attained such levels." The final bill did not address these concerns.

The Senate agreed to the House bill on May 3 and it waits the governor's signature. The bill can be found at

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS UPDATE



AROUND NEW ENGLAND

CT 4316 2006 (Adopted 5/1/07)

Updates the Connecticut Occupational Safety and Health Standards to reflect recent revisions to the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Standards. Protects the safety and health of Con-

necticut public sector workers to the extent required by this federally-funded program.

ME 8523 2006 (Adopted 4/4/07)

Establishes the procedure by which the manufacturer or user of a mercury relay, switch, instrument or measuring device may apply for an exemption from the sales prohibition under the Maine Revised Statutes.

RI 2925 2006 (Adopted 4/25/07)

Proposes rules regarding issuance air pollution control permits. Specifies rules for definitions, minor and major source permits, construction projects, emission banking, and severability.



ACTIVITIES ON BEACON HILL

MA 8962 2007 (Proposed)

Amends rules concerning timely action schedule and fee provisions as they relate to air quality control. Proposes to reduce timely action schedules for most permit categories by 20%, thereby reducing the overall transaction time allowed for rendering permit decisions. Responds to the expansion of the Department's web-based permitting and permit streamlining initiatives introduced in recent years, thus eliminating the need for long review schedules. Fosters a greater innovative and competitive economic climate while maintaining strong environmental oversight. Amends provisions relating to permits for asbestos, hazardous waste recycling, solid waste, industrial wastewater management, groundwater discharges, and other matters.

MA 8973 2007 (Approved 4/6/2007)

Amends rules pertaining to carbon monoxide alarms. Identifies requirements for the type, installation, location, maintenance and inspection of carbon monoxide alarms in every dwelling, building or structure occupied in whole or in part for residential purposes that contains fossil-fuel

burning equipment or incorporates enclosed parking within its structure.



Kennedy and Woolsey Introduce OSHA Legislation

Also as expected, OSHA reform legislation has been introduced in both the House and the Senate. Senator Edward Kennedy has introduced S 1244 in the Senate and Representative Lynn Woolsey has introduced the companion measure, HR 2049 in the House.

The bills are nearly identical to what Senator Kennedy has introduced in the past; however with the Democrats in charge the bills will undoubtedly receive serious consideration. The legislation is entitled the "Protecting America's Workers Act".

Major parts of the legislation:

Would extend OSHA coverage to the millions of state and municipal employees who are not covered by the OSHA Act. Only those government employees in states where there are State OSHA plans have coverage at this time. Note: Nearly everyone agrees that all workers should be covered. Separate legislation, HR 1517 has been introduced to cover these employees. AIHA supports this legislation on the condition that Congress appropriates adequate resources to OSHA and local governments to provide this coverage.

Increases protection for whistleblowers. Note: This has long been an issue with Senator Kennedy.

Increase criminal penalties. This section would increase the penalties for those who willfully violate provisions of the OSHA Act and these violations results in a fatality or serious incident. As an example, violations resulting in a death would now result in a penalty of \$50,000 to \$250,000. Again, AIHA supports increasing the criminal penalties to a felony for these willful

violators; however we are also concerned that those individuals on the front line of health and safety are not made the "scapegoats" for violations.

Employers would be forced to pay for employee's personal protective equipment. Note: Separate legislation has also been introduced on this issue. However, that legislation has been put on hold pending OSHA's announcement that they will voluntarily finalize the PPE standard by November of this year.

[Lamson & Sessions Recalls Floor Electrical Outlets Due to Shock or Electrocutation Hazards](#)

The recalled floor boxes are wired incorrectly resulting in reverse polarity. This poses a shock or electrocution hazard to consumers.

The drop-in floor boxes are used to provide an extra electrical outlet in the floor. They were sold under the Carlon(r) brand name and have a brass finish cover approximately 3 1/2 inches in diameter. "Carlon" is stamped into the plastic above the receptacle and the model number is located to the left of the receptacle. Model numbers E971FBDI and E971FBDIB are included in this recall.

[The Holmes Group Recalls Oil-Filled Electric Heaters Due to Fire Hazard](#)

A poor electrical connection within the heater can lead to overheating. This poses fire and thermal burn hazards.

The recall involves Holmes oil-filled electric heaters with model number HOH2505 and HOH2520. The model number and "Holmes(r)" are printed on the side of the unit near the bottom.

[Char-Broil Recalls Two-Burner Gas Grills Sold Exclusively at Big Lots Stores Due to Fire, Burn Hazard](#)

The recalled grills could have an incorrect heat shield that does not fit the grills. Without the correct heat shield, the propane tank, hose, and regulator could overheat and damage these components, presenting a risk of fire and burn to consumers, if a propane leak occurs.

Only Char-Broil gas grills with model number 463720407 are included in the recall. This is a two-burner 360 square inch cooking surface gas grill with a 170 square inch swing-away rack, two side shelves and a condiment basket. Char-Broil's logo is on the top of the lid of the grill. The serial number is located on the white rating label on the back of the upper front panel of the grill. The serial numbers range from G305040611002821 to G305040611003420.

[Acer America Corporation Recalls Notebook Computer Batteries Due to Previous Fires](#)

The lithium-ion batteries can overheat, posing a fire hazard to consumers.

Only lithium-ion batteries with certain part numbers and battery week codes and used in certain Acer notebook models, are included in the recall. See link: www.acerbatteryrecall.com/AcerWeb -- consumers also can contact Acer toll-free at (800) 503-2330 anytime.

[Sagittarius Sporting Goods Recalls Gas Grills Sold at Lowe's Stores for Fire, Burn Hazards](#)

Some of these grills could be missing a hose that connects the grill manifold to the side burner, which poses a risk of fires and burn injuries to consumers.

The recall involves 25-inch by 18-inch Perfect Flame brand, four-burner, stainless steel gas grills with date codes JU, JV, JW, JX, JY, or JZ. The name "Perfect Flame" is on the grill hood. The model number, 2518SL, and the date code are located on a label inside the left front door of the grill.

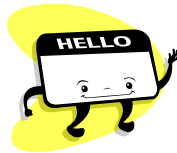
[Halogen Table Lamps Sold at Lowe's Stores Recalled Due to Fire Hazard](#)

These lamps can short circuit, posing a fire hazard.

The recalled table lamps have a plastic base and two extendable arms connecting the base to a

halogen lamp. The lamps were sold in white, red, blue, orange and purple. Item number 101988 is printed on the bottom of the lamp base.
