## Financial Update

About the Chapter Finances:

ASSE's Greater Boston Chapter (GBC) is a not-for-profit organization chartered in 1924 by ASSE National for the purpose of carrying out the objectives of the Society in its geographical area. Our geographic area encompasses the portion of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts east of the eastern border of Worcester County, including the counties of Barnstable, Bristol, Dukes, Essex, Middlesex, Nantucket, Norfolk, Plymouth, and Suffolk; and the entire state of Rhode Island. We have two Sections established, those being, the Ocean State Section and a Student Section at the University of Massachusetts Lowell Campus.

Our financial health is primarily funded by member dues. Other funding sources include fees from an annual ASP/CSP review course as well as limited fees from an annual Professional Development Course (PDC), an annual social event and an annual golf tournament called BOSGO.

**Current Cash Available and Investment Strategy**  
The GBC has several banking arrangements and investments to maximize the financial health for the organization. Monies are held in a small business checking account, mutual funds and various holdings with Fidelity Investments. The following bullets highlight current totals:

**GBC Budgetary Status**

As a chapter, we maintain a fiscal budget just like any other business or organization. Our budget is monitored and reported on and approved at timely meetings with the chapter Ex-

Executive Committee and other members of the Board of Directors. The budget serves as a guide to ensure fiscal health for the chapter and its members.

#### About the Duties of the Chapter Treasurer

I am new in my role as Chapter Treasurer and present the following article as an overview of our financial status. I work under the guidance of the VP of Finance, Kara Haley. My responsibility as Treasurer involves:

Maintaining all financial records of the Chapter as assigned by the Vice President of Finance.

Receive and disburse funds as directed by the Vice President of Finance.

Maintain Chapter funds in a depository approved by the Chapter Executive Committee and the Board of Directors.

Disburse funds as required to meet Chapter expenses and obligations. Payments shall be by check and duly recorded in a register. Disbursements of funds for less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) may be delegated to the appointed Chapter Treasurer. Disbursements of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and greater shall be co-signed by any two of the following: Vice President Finance, Treasurer, President Elect or President. Multiple checks to one payee shall not be written to avoid the co-signature requirement.

Withdraw investment funds for Chapter purposes only as approved by the Vice President of Finance, the Executive Committee or the Board of Directors.

Take deposits to all accounts including investment funds.

If directed by the Vice President of Finance, transmit to Society Headquarters by the date specified by the Society the audited income and expense statement for the end of the fiscal year, and submit to the IRS any required tax documents.

Assume the duties of the Vice President of Finance as necessary.

#### Closing Statement

I am glad to serve the chapter as Treasurer this year. If you haven't considered volunteering or contributing to the GBC - - now is the time to do it. In my opinion, any safety professional can stand to benefit by being a member of ASSE and becoming actively involved in chapter activities. It is important to note that we have an opening on the "Investments Committee". ## NATIONAL GUARD UNIT WILL HEADLINE EDUCATION FORUM

BOSTON -- The National Guard's First Civil Support Team (CST) will display its newest equipment at the next education forum sponsored by the Maritime Incident Resource and Training Partnership on Wednesday, Oct. 26, at Black Falcon Cruise Terminal, South Boston, and beginning at 1000 HR.

Members of the maritime industry, first responders from all public safety agencies, EMS personnel and public health officials are encouraged to attend.

The team, headquartered in Wellesley (MA), is one of scores of units strategically located across the nation to support civil authorities at the scene of a chemical, biological or radiological (CBR) incident by identifying CBR agents/substances, assessing current and projected consequences, advising on response measures, and assisting with appropriate re-

quests for additional support. The CST is able to conduct operations independently up to 72 hours with internal supplies and resources, depending on the number and timing of hot-zone entries made.

The team has been training with numerous first response agencies from across the state. This event will provide agency representatives interested in arranging cross-training activities to meet team members and acquaint themselves with the team's capabilities.

CST equipment includes:

- 1) Levels A, B, and C protective ensembles; MOPP; M40 series protective masks; and self-contained breathing apparatus.
- 2) Sampling equipment with CB sampling kits and CBR detection equipment.
- 3) Analytical equipment, such as the Analytical Laboratory System (ALS) to provide analysis of incident-related samples.
- 4) Communications equipment, such as the UCS, to provide enhanced architecture and ensure communications and data connectivity between federal, state, and local response forces (the UCS is a self-contained, air-transportable system that is capable of continuous fixed and mobile operations).

With the ALS and UCS working together, team members can function as on-site observers for experts from around the country and can take the samples, readings, and observations that enable responsive and accurate assistance to the local incident commander.

The design of the UCS considers the need for flexibility in establishing communications with many agencies and activities. The UCS is capable of utilizing all necessary frequency bands to ensure adequate voice and data connectivity. Its capabilities include high-frequency, ultrahigh-frequency (UHF), very-high-frequency (VHF), and tactical frequency-modulated (FM) satellite communications; secure phone; facsimile (FAX) copy; telecomputer; printer; teleconference/video; global positioning system (GPS); and an internal and external power generation. Wideband communications and a cellular and landline telephone system permit rapid and complete transfer of large data files to support mission planning and reporting. A family of hand held radios and base stations ensure radio connectivity with local emergency service units.

## News and Notes

### CPSC, Hewlett-Packard Company Announce Recall of Notebook Computer Batteries

In cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), Hewlett-Packard Company, of Palo Alto, Calif. is voluntarily recalling about 135,000 HP and Compaq Notebook Computer Battery Packs. An internal short can cause the battery cells to overheat and melt or char the plastic case, posing a burn and fire hazard.

### CPSC Chairman Calls for Comprehensive Safety Review of Portable Generators

In light of continuing CO deaths and injuries from the consumer use of portable generators, CPSC Chairman Hal Stratton has directed the staff to undertake a thorough review of portable generator safety.

### NFPA provides free access to standards important to Katrina recovery.

Working with the Department of Homeland Security and first responders, NFPA is providing four of its standards identified by DHS as important to the hurricane recovery effort in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. The following documents, in PDF format, are available at no cost:

- NFPA 241, Safeguarding Construction, Alteration, and Demolition Operations
- NFPA 1201, Providing Emergency Services to the Public
- NFPA 1221, Installation, Maintenance, and Use of Emergency Services Communications Systems
- NFPA 1410, Training for Initial Emergency Scene Operations

## Fire-Safe Cigarettes

Reps. Edward Markey (D-MA) and Peter King (R-NY) have introduced the [Cigarette Fire Safety Act of 2005](#), a bill that will set a national ignition standard for cigarettes. (A similar bill - the Cigarette Fire Safety Act (S 389) - was re-introduced by Senator Richard Durbin (D-IL) and has been referred to the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.) The tobacco industry currently produces two types of cigarettes: those which meet the New York State safety requirement for a "self-extinguishing" standard and cigarettes for the rest of the country. The bipartisan legislation introduced on April 26, 2005, would extend the protection of the New York standard to the rest of the country. [Smoking materials](#) are the number one cause of fire fatalities each year, causing approximately 800 deaths each year.

### **OSHA Fines BP Products North America More Than \$21 Million Following Texas City Explosion Company Agrees to Make Extensive Plant-Wide Improvements**

**WASHINGTON** -- BP Products North America Inc. has agreed to pay more than \$21 million in penalties for safety and health violations following an investigation of a fatal explosion at its Texas City, Texas, plant March 23 that claimed the lives of 15 workers and injured more than 170 others. The penalties are part of a settlement agreement [announced](#) today by the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

"This citation and penalty - nearly double the next largest fine in OSHA history - sends a strong message to all employers about the need to protect workers and to make health and safety a core value," Solicitor of Labor Howard M. Radzely stated. "BP will pay the full fine, abate all the hazards, and significantly improve their safety measures."

## Boston Countertop Maker Cited Again for Safety and Health Hazards

**BOSTON** -- The U.S. Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has cited a Boston maker of granite and marble countertops for 10 instances of failing to correct hazards cited in a 2004 OSHA inspection. Proposed penalties total \$58,500.

Rozetti Marble and Granite LLC was first cited by OSHA in Sept. 2004 for 15 serious violations of workplace safety and health standards. At the time, the company agreed to correct all cited hazards and pay \$9,870 in fines. A follow-up inspection in April found several hazards remained uncorrected.

Hazards the company failed to abate included employees exposed to excess levels of silica and lack of engineering controls to reduce exposure levels; no written respiratory protection program; failure to institute a hearing conservation program and provide hearing protection for employees exposed to excess noise levels; misuse of unguarded grinders; untrained employees operating forklifts; employees operating forklifts without using seatbelts; and no written hazard communication program.

## U.S. Announces Clean Air Agreement with ExxonMobil Nearly 77 Percent of Domestic Refining Capacity Now Under Consent Decrees

(Washington, D.C.-October 11, 2005) ExxonMobil has reached a comprehensive Clean Air Act (CAA) agreement that is expected to reduce harmful air emissions by more than 53,000 tons per year at the company's seven U.S. petroleum refineries, the Department of Justice and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced today. The seven refineries, located in five states, represent approximately 11 percent of the total refining capacity in the United States. Today's settlement is the 17th in a joint DOJ-EPA initiative to reduce pollution in domestic petroleum refineries nationwide, bringing nearly 77 percent of domestic refining capacity under consent decree. These settlements were reached without litigation as the companies agreed to work with the government in reaching settlements that would protect the environment

and allow refiners to expand fuel production in compliance with the environmental laws.

### UPDATE FROM BEACON HILL

#### ACTIVITIES ON BEACON HILL

The following information is provided to update members regarding legislative efforts to install restrictions on drivers within the boundaries of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. As the old saying goes..."you want action?...then speak to your Congressman" - - in this case, speak to your designated Massachusetts State Representative or State Senator to voice your opinion on any of the bills that are listed below:

**H 2035** - Legislation allowing the use of only "hands free" cellular phones in vehicles.

**H 1995** - Legislation prohibiting drivers from operating a radio or any sound amplification system that can be heard outside their vehicle from a distance of more than 50 feet.

**H 1036** - Legislation prohibiting anyone from driving a motor vehicle with an accumulation of snow or ice that constitutes a threat to public safety.

**H 1125** - Legislation requiring public schools to implement a specific policy to address teen dating violence.

**H 4099** - The Judiciary Committee heard testimony on "Melanie's Law" - - named after 13

year old Melanie Powell of Marshfield MA who was killed in 2003 by a repeat drunk driver.

Provisions include increasing the minimum penalties for repeat drunken drivers, allowing the impoundment of the cars of repeat offenders and requiring drivers who receive hardship licenses to install an ignition interlock device in their cars.

### ASSE Supports OSH Coverage for Government Workers

ASSE expressed its support for Representative Phil English's (R-PA) bill to provide OSH coverage to all government workers. As it stands now, only state and local workers who happen to reside in a OSH state plan state are covered. The importance of this issue has been heightened as we all see these workers on our TV screens risking their lives in hurricane-stricken areas. Support for such coverage has been a long-standing ASSE position.

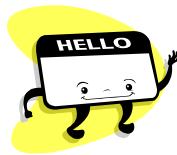
